MEMORANDUM FOR Joint Service Reserve Component Facility Board (JSRCFB) Members

SUBJECT: Minutes of 11 September 2015 JSRCFB Meeting

1. In accordance with DOD Directive 1225.7, the FY 15 Joint Service Reserve Component Facility Board (JSRCFB) convened at 0938 on 11 September 2015 at the VING JFHQ Building on St. Croix, USVI.

2. Attendees were:

COL William Sherrill – Chief of Staff VI Air National Guard (ANG Rep)
COL Daryl Jaschen – Vice Chief of Staff VI Army National Guard (ARNG Rep)
Mr. Alphaeus Anthony – Unit Administrator, 512th MTC (USAR Rep)
LTC Carolyn Lanclos – CFMO for Virgin Islands – (ARNG Alternate and Records Custodian)
COL Deborah Lobbenmeier – USP&FO for Virgin Islands (Guest)
CPT Dionisio Diaz Rosario – Commander, 512th MTC (Guest)

3. LTC Lanclos served as chairperson of the meeting and Mr. Anthony and CPT Diaz attended via teleconference.

4. Introductions were made and CPT Diaz was welcomed as a first time attendee. LTC Lanclos explained the purpose of the JSRCFB and asked if there were any questions.

5. CPT Diaz indicated that although it was not a construction issue, the 512 MTC would be needing some space at the Readiness Center on St. Thomas to store a 20 foot CONEX and three TRICONS containing equipment for the unit. Discussion ensued and it was determined that the matter would be coordinated with the VI Army National Guard (VIARNG) Operations Sergeant on St. Thomas.

6. The attendees then moved on to discuss projects that were on the Army National Guard's long range construction plan from the prior year.

a. Field Maintenance Shop #2 on St. Thomas. LTC Lanclos indicated that this was still the number one priority project for the VIARNG and had been submitted for consideration for the

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FYDP. It was agreed that it was both a unilateral construction and usage project, as the USAR did not contemplate having any military vehicles on St. Thomas in the near future.

b. Field Maintenance Shop #1 on St. Croix. LTC Lanclos indicated that this was the number two priority project for the VIARNG and was also submitted for FYDP consideration. All agreed that this was also a unilateral construction and usage project.

c. Alteration of the Lionel A. Jackson Readiness Center on St. Croix. All agreed that based on prior year's discussion this remained a unilateral construction and usage project.

d. Alteration of the Leonard B. Francis Readiness Center on St. Thomas. LTC Lanclos advised that based on prior year's discussions this would be unilateral construction, but joint use with the USAR as it is currently. COL Jaschen inquired whether the USAR had any information regarding what their future footprint would be on St. Thomas or the Virgin Islands in general. CPT Diaz indicated that the understanding is that it would remain the same for the foreseeable future.

e. Regional Training Institute, Phase II. LTC Lanclos indicated if this happened it would be unilateral construction and use, and all concurred.

f. Military Vehicle Parking Expansion and Improvement on St. Croix. LTC Lanclos indicated that this would most likely be an SRM project. All concurred that this would be unilateral construction and use.

g. Military Vehicle Parking Expansion and Improvement on St. Thomas. Also most likely an SRM project. Potential for joint use if 512th moved vehicles to St. Thomas, but most likely both unilateral construction and use.

h. USPFO Warehouse Expansion projects on both St. Thomas and St. Croix. Per LTC Lanclos, these are SRM projects. All agreed that these would be unilateral construction and use.

6. Discussion next turned to proposed Air National Guard (ANG) projects that could be considered for joint construction or usage. COL Sherrill indicated that the only project that would fit that category was a project for a communications vehicle storage facility that should be awarded in FY15 and would be a part of the Joint Force Headquarters. During the course of discussion, it was pointed out that the facility was part of the ANG's contribution to its share of the Joint Force Headquarters construction. Based on that information, it was determined that the project met the requirement for joint construction and joint use.

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7. Next, inquiry was made regarding whether the USAR had any projects planned for the Virgin Islands, and Mr. Anthony responded that there were none.

8. During the course of the meeting general discussion included the following topics.

a. COL Jaschen inquired of CPT Diaz where the 512th did their weapons qualification, because the VING was in the process of acquiring a Modular Small Arms Range on St. Croix somewhere between FYs 16 and 17 and perhaps his unit could also utilize it. CPT Diaz indicated that he would inform his battalion.

b. COL Jaschen inquired of LTC Lanclos what the plan was for the Ham's Bluff facility that was to be renovated for use by the Medical Command. LTC Lanclos responded that it appeared that the Medical Command relocation would not be going forward; so pending discussions with the new TAG, the facility could become a candidate for disposal under the Army's Reduce the Footprint initiative to reduce excess property, if another use could not be found for it.

c. CPT Diaz expressed his appreciation for the support the 512th MTC has been receiving from the VI National Guard over the years.

9. After discussion about holding the FY 16 meeting during the second quarter of the fiscal year and who would be the host, the meeting was adjourned at 1020.



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
